1. THE ANNUAL CAMPUS SAFETY AND SECURITY REPORT

National American University (NAU) encourages all students, employees and university community members to be fully aware of the safety and security issues on all of its campuses and to take action to prevent and to report illegal and inappropriate activities. National American University firmly believes that personal safety practices are the foundation of a safe campus community.

Therefore, and pursuant to the Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act, National American University (1) monitors criminal activity, (2) publishes this annual report, and (3) maintains a three-year statistical history on all its campuses and at off-campus property or facilities owned or rented by NAU or recognized university organizations. The university will distribute a copy of and/or provide access to this report pursuant to the Clery Act, including notifying prospective students and prospective employees of its availability and, further, providing a copy of the report upon written request.

National American University has no authority to require any local law enforcement agency in any state in which the university maintains campuses and campus facilities or the judicial court process to take any action in connection with a reported crime. National American University encourages prosecution of all criminal violations through the criminal courts and, if appropriate, the university student conduct process for violations committed on campus by other students.

National American University currently has a number of policies and procedures relating to campus security and safety, and the university expressly reserves the right to modify those policies or procedures or adopt additional policies or procedures at any time without notice. Such changes may appear in successive issues of this annual report. Furthermore, the university maintains policies on alcohol and drugs, sexual harassment and student conduct that describe expectations in student behavior. An employee policy manual outlines the university's requirements for staff in terms of emergencies and interaction with others in accordance with the university's mission and purposes.

Definitions:

Business Day: Is defined as Monday through Friday, excluding any day when the institution is closed.

Campus: Any building or property owned or controlled by an institution within the same reasonably contiguous geographic area and used by the institution in direct support of, or in a manner related to, the institution's educational purposes, including residence halls, and any building or property within the same reasonably contiguous geographic area of the institution that is owned by the institution but controlled by another person, is frequently used by students, and supports institutional purposes.

Campus Security Authority: (1) A police or campus security department maintained by an institution. (2) An individual or organization specified in an institution's statement of campus security policy as an individual or organization to which students and employees should report criminal offenses. (3) An official of an institution who has significant responsibility for student campus activities, including, but not limited to, student housing, activities, student discipline and campus judicial proceedings.

Non-campus Buildings or Property: Any building or property owned or controlled by a student organization recognized by the institution; or any building or property (other than a branch campus) owned or controlled by an institution that is used in direct support of, or in relation to the institution's educational purposes; is frequently used by students, and is not within the same reasonably contiguous geographic area of the institution.

Public Property: (1) All public property, including streets, sidewalks, and parking facilities, that is within the outer perimeter surrounding all property and buildings on the campus of the institution that are adjacent to one another. (2) Any sidewalk, street or parking facility immediately adjacent to any property or building on the outer perimeter described in clause (1). (3) Any street, sidewalk or parking facility immediately adjacent to any facility or property within the same reasonably contiguous geographic area that is outside the perimeter described in clause (1) and is used by the institution in direct support of, or in a manner related to the institution's educational purpose.

Professional Counselor: An employee of an institution whose primary responsibility is providing psychological counseling to members of the institution's community and who is functioning within the scope of his or her license or certification.

Referred For Campus Disciplinary Action: Written referral of any student to any campus official who initiates a disciplinary action of which a record is kept and which may result in the imposition of sanctions.

Student Residences: A subset of "On Campus" crimes that includes only those crimes that were reported to have occurred in residence halls or other residential facilities.

2. CRIME REPORTING POLICIES

A. Reporting Policies

1. The university does not maintain a campus police or campus safety department. The Rapid City campus retains the services of a private security service. Mountain States Security may be contacted by calling 343-7448. All criminal reports should be made on each campus as follows:

Everyone on campus (including students, faculty, staff and visitors) is also encouraged to report immediately any crime or potential criminal activity to the local police department (911 or 9-911) that serves the campus location where the crime occurred. Individuals reporting to NAU who also wish to file a complaint with the local police department will be provided with assistance from NAU personnel upon request. The above-referenced list of university personnel should also be used to report criminal offenses for the purpose of making timely warning reports and the annual statistical disclosure. These personnel will serve as the university's liaison with all appropriate law enforcement agencies on each respective campus.

2. National American University normally requires a written complaint from someone to begin the investigation process. The university also normally needs the assistance of the complainant in the disciplinary process, if applicable, against the accused. The university will make exceptions when necessary, including cases presenting clear danger to the victim and/or the university community.
3. The university will respond to reports of criminal activity by (a) investigating all allegations in conjunction with the local police department, (b) classify all reports in conjunction with the appropriate police agency according to the FBI Uniform Crime Reporting Definitions, and (c) forward the case to the university conduct officer for investigation and appropriate action when alleged perpetrators are identified as students, which investigation may occur independently, before, during or after any campus judicial process.

B. Crime Reporting Procedures

1. All criminal activity occurring on campus should be reported immediately to the appropriate local campus security authority as listed in Paragraph 2.A.1. or the appropriate local police department (911 or 9-911). Campus personnel will assist the complainant in completing criminal reports. These reports will also be forwarded to the appropriate police department. In certain cases, reports will also be shared with university personnel for campus conduct proceedings. The university will assist the appropriate local police department with investigations.
2. If you are a victim of a crime or witness a crime:
 - a. Call the campus security authority for the campus on which the criminal activity occurred or the local police department (dial 911 or 9-911) for any emergency including medical assistance, fires, suspicious people or activities, crime reports, traffic accidents, or other illegal activities;
 - b. Obtain a description of the offender(s), including sex, age, race, hair, clothing and other distinguishable features. Attempt to obtain a description and license number of any vehicle involved. Note the direction taken by offenders or vehicles and report those to campus security or the police; and
 - c. Preserve the crime scene. Do not touch any items involved in the incident. Close off the area of the incident and do not allow anyone in the crime area until the campus security authority and/or local police arrive.
3. The appropriate campus security authority will accept third-party reports in cases of sexual assault in order to protect the victim's identity.
4. All employees, faculty or staff who become aware of an allegation of violation of university policy, student code of conduct, civil or criminal law should report the allegation to their supervisor or senior campus administrator. The following people with "significant responsibility" for student and campus activities must report potential criminal activity of which they are aware: academic deans, directors of admissions, career planning and student services personnel, deans, department chairs, financial aid director, student account director, housing director, international student advisor, provost, human resources director, president, registrar, resident assistant, private security guards, university bookstore

supervisor, associate provost, as well as any assistants and associates. These individuals should not attempt to investigate, but should instead report and allow the police to investigate. Licensed and pastoral counselors are exempted from these reporting procedures. The function of these administrators (significant responsibility) is not to determine whether a crime took place. That is the function of the law enforcement professionals working within the criminal justice system.

5. All persons in the NAU community are encouraged to assist anyone in reporting alleged criminal activity by contacting the campus security authority at the campus where the criminal activity occurred and/or the local police department, as well as providing assistance in making the incident report.
6. Failure to report criminal activity to the campus security authority in a timely manner may result in disciplinary action by the university.
7. University employees and students, who are not members of the campus security authority, are encouraged to assist anyone reporting alleged criminal activity in contacting the campus security authority and/or the local police department in order to file a criminal report.
8. Criminal activity may be reported voluntarily and confidentially to the campus security authority.
9. Counselors are required to provide statistical information relating to crimes on campus but may continue to honor the confidentiality of victims.

C. Timely Warning Reports

The university will issue a timely warning to members of the campus community in cases of reported murder (non-negligent), sex offenses, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, motor vehicle theft and any hate crimes (manifesting evidence of prejudice based on race, religion, sexual orientation or ethnicity) of murder, forcible rape or aggravated assault, in those cases where university personnel determine there is a continuing threat to the university community. In such cases, timely warnings will be published at the applicable campus on bulletin boards in the student lounge as well as other locations on campus.

D. Preparation of Annual Security Report

National American University will issue an annual report of criminal reports made to campus security authorities and law enforcement agencies for property or facilities. The annual report includes reported crimes alleged to have occurred on the campus and facilities owned or rented by NAU and/or recognized student organizations. It includes the following reports of crime: (a) murder (negligent/non-negligent), (b) sex offenses (forcible/non-forcible), (c) robbery, (d) aggravated assault, (e) burglary, (f) motor vehicle theft, (g) murders evidencing hate crime, (h) forcible rape evidencing hate crime, (i) aggravated assault evidencing hate crime, (j) liquor law violations, (k) drug abuse violations, and (l) weapons possession. Information obtained from incident reports from all campuses in the National American University system are forwarded to the system vice president for academic operations and learner services. The results are then tabulated and ultimately entered into the Department of Education's website as required by law. The Annual Crime Awareness and Campus Security Report is then compiled from this data and either the report, or notification of the existence of the report, is distributed to campus security officers to make available to university students and employees.

3. SAFETY OF AND ACCESS TO CAMPUS FACILITIES

A. Personal Safety Recommendations:

1. National American University staff are available to assist you in protecting yourself by providing safety and security information, such as posters and brochures. However, only you can protect yourself by being aware of your surroundings and taking appropriate steps in preventing crime from happening.
2. If you reside in the residence hall on the Rapid City campus, protect your room by locking your door (even if you are only going out for a short time or only going a short distance). According to crime studies, it only takes eight seconds to walk into your open room and steal your valuables. Also, always lock your door when you are asleep. You are also encouraged to lock your door when you are awake. Never open exterior doors of the residence hall building for strangers or non-residents. Always escort your guests to and from the building. Do not lend your room keys to anyone, even a classmate or a friend. They may not be careful with your keys and many misplace them, giving the wrong person access. Do not leave your keys lying around in public places or in your jacket pocket when you are not wearing it. Do not put your name or address on key rings as they may be used to steal your property.
3. Do not prop open locked exterior building doors at any NAU campus facility. These doors are locked for your protection and the protection of others.

B. Protect Your Property

1. Personal property (purses, briefcases, calculators, computers, etc.) should never be left unattended. Take such items with you if you are leaving the office, classroom, residence hall or any other unsecured location.
2. Always lock your car doors.
3. Do not leave valuables in plain view. Always take your valuables with you when you leave the campus premises.
4. If you live in the residence halls at the Rapid City campus, you are encouraged to open a savings or checking account rather than allow large sums of money to accumulate in your room. If you open a checking account, remember the number of the last check written. The theft of a single check can go undetected until a bank statement discloses a forgery.

C. Protect Your Automobile

1. Always lock your car doors and never leave your keys in the vehicle.
2. Try to park your car in a well-lit area.
3. Avoid leaving property where it is visible.
4. If you arrive at or leave the National American University late at night, you should use extra caution when walking to your vehicle. It is preferable to walk to the parking lot with others if at all possible.

D. Protect Yourself At Night

1. Avoid walking alone at night.
2. Refrain from taking shortcuts and walk where there is plenty of light and traffic.
3. Walk with a friend.

E. Protect Yourself Walking And Jogging

1. Avoid walking and jogging alone after dark.
2. Walk along well-lit routes.
3. Be alert to your surroundings. If you suspect you are being followed, run in a different direction, go to the other side of the street and yell for help, or head quickly for a lighted area or a group of people.
4. Have your keys ready when returning to your residence hall or apartment and keep your personal valuables concealed and close to your body.

F. Help NAU Protect You

1. Watch for suspicious persons in and around university buildings and in parking lots. Do not pursue them. Call the campus security authority immediately. If you reside in the residence hall facility on the Rapid City campus, call the police if you should enter your room and find a stranger, regardless of the "cover story" supplied.
2. If you see any suspicious activity or people on or near campus, call the campus security authority on your campus or the local police department (911 or 9-911). If dialing from a campus phone you must dial 9-911. Do not assume that what you observe is an innocent activity or that it has already been reported.
3. Do not assume the person is a visitor or university staff member who you have not seen before.
4. Suspicious people may be loitering about at unusual hours and locations, running, especially if something of value is being carried; exhibiting unusual mental or physical symptoms, persons could be under the influence of drugs or otherwise needing medical or psychiatric assistance; carrying property that may be suspicious depending on the circumstances, going room to room trying door handles. Door-to-door soliciting is not permitted at any university facility. Violations of this rule should be reported to the campus security authority or the local police immediately.
5. Report all thefts and property loss immediately to the campus security authority or the local police.
6. Be security conscious at all times.

G. Security Considerations Of Campus Facilities

1. All National American University campus facilities are for the use of the students, faculty, staff and their guests and those on official business with National American University. All others are subject to being charged with trespassing.
2. Access to campus buildings is limited to normal business hours.
3. Students, faculty, staff and visitors are encouraged to report needed repairs to National American University staff.

H. Policies And Procedures For Safe Access To Buildings

1. Keys are issued to authorized faculty, staff and students only.
2. Exterior building doors should not be propped open when the doors are locked.
3. Classroom buildings hours vary from campus to campus, please check with your campus for building hours.
4. Building evacuation is mandatory for all fire alarms.
5. Problems related to people in buildings after hours should be reported to the campus security authority at the campus where the activity occurred.

4. NAU'S RELATIONSHIP WITH LOCAL LAW ENFORCEMENT

- A. Campus security authorities (as identified in Paragraph 2.A.1. above) are employees of National American University. They are not certified or sworn peace officers. However, the campus security authorities are authorized, when appropriate, to make a citizen's arrest. Typically, such arrests would be made only in the presence of licensed police officers.
- B. National American University is committed to working closely with local police departments, sheriff's departments and state and federal law enforcement agencies to track and respond to campus criminal activity.
- C. Students and employees are strongly encouraged to report all crimes immediately. All criminal activity on the NAU campus should be reported to the campus security authority on the campus where the activity took place (see Paragraph 2.A.1.) and/or the appropriate local police department (911 or 9-911).
- D. National American University personnel will assist the complainant in completing any criminal reports.

- E. National American University will accept third party reports in most cases (e.g., sex offenses). However, the university prefers to receive reports from the victim as the detail is often more accurate when received directly from the victim.
- F. Victims and witnesses to crimes should attempt to maintain all physical evidence. Do not wash or destroy what may be critical evidence.
- G. Victims and witnesses should report as much detail as possible to ensure accurate reporting. If you are a victim of a crime, your immediate recall of the event is often the best. Write down as much information as you can remember after a crime. If you cannot identify the perpetrator by name, try to recall as many details as possible, including gender; approximate age; height; weight/build; description of face including eye color, hair color; hair styles (short, curly, etc.); dress/clothing; facial hair; glasses; distinguishing marks including scars; distinguishing gait; and voice.
- H. National American University encourages pastoral counselors and professional counselors, if deemed appropriate, to inform persons they are counseling to report crimes on a voluntary, confidential basis for inclusion in the annual disclosure of crime statistics. In the event a person wishes to make such a report, the campus security authority (identified in Paragraph 2.A.1.) for the campus on which the crime took place will take that report and such information obtained will be kept strictly confidential.

5. CRIME SAFETY AND CRIME PREVENTION PROGRAMMING

National American University provides certain crime safety and crime prevention programs and services including crime prevention brochures, student handbook, sexual assault awareness information, etc. For more information concerning crime safety and crime prevention programs/services visit the local campus security authority.

- A. Annual Report Distribution: National American University will distribute notification of the existence and location of the NAU Annual Crime Awareness and Campus Security Report Act to all students, faculty, staff and employees by October 1st of each year. The annual report may also be viewed at the following web site:

A paper copy of the annual report may be obtained by contacting the campus security authority on campus.

- B. Past Annual Reports: Copies of the university's past annual reports may be obtained on the website above or by contacting (605) 721-5215.
- C. Assistance: In cases where the alleged perpetrator is a student and taking the same classes as the complainant, the complainant may request the National American University registrar to change class schedules. Such requests will be granted if reasonably available and if a complaint has been filed with National American University and/or the appropriate local police department. If desired, NAU personnel will assist individuals in making a report to the local police department.

In cases where the alleged perpetrator and the complainant live in the same residence hall at the Rapid City campus, the complainant may request the associate dean of student services to change, temporarily or permanently, his or her housing assignment. Such a request will be granted if reasonably available and if a complaint has been filed with National American University and/or the Rapid City Police Department (605-394-4134).

- D. National American University provides programs on campus safety and security. Each campus develops and presents educational programs (at least one program per calendar year) in the areas of crime

prevention, sexual assault awareness, self-defense, annoying phone calls, personal safety, etc. National American University also has available brochures, flyers, pamphlets, movies, videos and posters concerning various safety and security issues. The university will develop and present any security-related program upon request.

- E. National American University has a means of notifying students, faculty and staff on how to obtain information about registered sex offenders. In that regard, student handbooks, bulletin boards, dean of student services' offices and learning resources centers have posted the 1-800 numbers in each state where NAU has a campus. Selected states also have web site information available. Students and employees may access those telephone numbers or websites to check on any person, student or employee they feel is a possible registered sex offender.

National American University also provides outreach counseling information to aid students in coping with a variety of issues, including sexual assault awareness, personal safety, alcohol and drug abuse.

6. CAMPUS CRIME TIMELY WARNING

If the campus security authority on the campus where a criminal activity has occurred determines that the crime (or series of crimes) poses a continuing threat or danger to the university community, the university will publish a warning through any or all of the following media: campus bulletins, classroom announcements, campus newspaper, residence hall bulletins, electronic mail, etc.

7. MONITORING AND RECORDING ACTIVITY AT OFF-CAMPUS LOCATIONS

- A. Any National American University recognized organization that exists off campus at any university location will still be observed by the local police department. The mere fact that such a facility or organization is located off-campus does not mean activities at that location are not observed. Activities monitored by local police departments share information with the local National American University campus security authority.
- B. National American University includes any off-campus student organizations' crime statistics in its annual reports as part of the crime statistics at National American University.

8. POLICY REGARDING THE ILLEGALITY OF ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES ON NAU CAMPUSES AND ENFORCEMENT OF UNDERAGE DRINKING

- A. National American University forbids the use, consumption, possession, manufacture, sale, transportation or furnishing of alcoholic beverages on campus. The university also forbids the maintenance of unlawful drinking places on any of its campuses. This prohibition of possession or consumption of alcoholic beverages on campus applies regardless of age.
- B. National American University enforces the drinking laws of each state (South Dakota, Colorado, Minnesota, New Mexico, Kansas, Missouri and Texas), including the prohibition of use by persons less than 21 years of age. Possession or consumption of alcohol on any campus is prohibited by National American University and may result in student disciplinary proceedings and/or arrest.

9. SUBSTANCE ABUSE: ALCOHOL AND ILLEGAL DRUGS—POLICIES, SANCTIONS, HEALTH RISKS AND RESOURCES

- A. Policy on Alcohol and Drug Use

National American University desires to have its facilities free of alcohol and illicit drugs and to operate all of its academic and co-curricular programs accordingly.

The possession, distribution or consumption of alcoholic beverages is prohibited on all university property, whether owned or leased. The possession, distribution or consumption of alcoholic beverages is prohibited at all student-attended, university-sponsored functions, regardless of location.

The university prohibits the unlawful possession, distribution, or use of illegal drugs and/or controlled substances on any property leased or owned by the university or in any program or activity sponsored by the university in any location.

B. University Sanctions

Anyone violating this policy regarding alcohol, illegal drugs and/or controlled substances will be subject to disciplinary action. In particular:

1. Employees who violate the prohibition against illegal drugs and alcohol are subject to discipline up to and including dismissal. Discipline may include, but is not limited to, written warnings, suspension, referral for evaluation, and educational classes. Referral for prosecution may occur where appropriate.
2. An employee who is convicted of a criminal drug-statute violation that occurred in the workplace is required to inform his or her campus executive officer.
3. Campus executive officers who are aware of any criminal drug-statute convictions for violations that occurred in the workplace must report them to the human resources department within three calendar days of their notice of the conviction.
4. Students who violate the prohibition against illegal drugs and alcohol are subject to discipline. Sanctions will reflect the particular violation and its severity. Depending on the circumstances of the violation, disciplinary action may include, but is not limited to: warning, fine, referral to chemical health treatment or support resources, suspension, or expulsion. Referral for criminal prosecution may occur where appropriate.

C. Legal Sanctions

This description is intended to provide a basic, general understanding of the range of serious legal sanctions which can arise from the unlawful possession, distribution and/or use of illicit drugs and alcohol. Individuals who are concerned about specific circumstances should consult applicable laws and/or seek legal counsel.

In addition to the federal and state sanctions outlined below, secondary civil consequences may also flow from criminal drug violations. Property associated with the criminal acts, including homes and vehicles, can be confiscated by the state or federal government. Those who are convicted of felony violations may be barred from governmental employment or from licensed professions such as law, medicine and teaching. In addition, individuals may face a variety of penalties imposed by municipal ordinances.

2. State - Drug Penalties:

COLORADO:

Colorado state criminal statutes may be generally found under Titles 12 and 18 of the Colorado Revised Statutes. The maximum penalty for the most serious single offense, (manufacture, sale, or distribution) is twelve (12) years in prison and a \$750,000.00 fine. The maximum penalty for the least serious state offense (possession or use of one ounce or less of marijuana) is a fine of \$100.00. The state laws concerning driving under the influence of alcohol (see below) apply equally to driving under the influence of drugs.

KANSAS:

Kansas state criminal statutes may be generally found under Chapter 21 of the Kansas Statutes Annotated. Drug offenses are listed in Article 36a. The maximum penalty for the most serious single offense, (manufacture, sale, or distribution) is sixteen (16) years in prison and a \$500,000.00 fine. The maximum penalty for the least serious state offense (possession of a simulated controlled substance) is a jail term of up to one (1) year and/or a \$2,500.00 fine. The state laws concerning driving under the influence of alcohol (see below) also apply to driving under the influence of drugs.

MINNESOTA:

Minnesota statutes related to drugs and controlled substances may be generally found under Chapter 152 of the Minnesota Statutes. The maximum penalty for the most serious single offense, (manufacture, sale, or distribution) is thirty (30) years in prison and/or payment of a \$1,000,000.00 fine. The maximum penalty for the least serious state offense (possession of a small amount of marijuana) is a jail term of up to ninety (90) days and/or a \$1,000.00 fine. The state laws concerning driving under the influence of alcohol (see below) apply equally to driving under the influence of drugs.

MISSOURI:

Drug Regulations are found in Chapter 195 of the Missouri Revised Statutes. Statutes related to criminal penalties may be generally found under Chapters 557, 558 (imprisonment), and 560 (fines). The maximum penalty for the most serious single offense, (manufacture, sale, or distribution) is thirty (30) years in prison. The maximum penalty for the least serious state offense (possession of less than 35 grams of marijuana) is a jail term of up to one (1) year imprisonment and/or a \$1,000.00 fine. The state laws concerning driving under the influence of alcohol (see below) apply equally to driving under the influence of drugs.

NEW MEXICO:

New Mexico state criminal statutes may be generally found under Chapter 30 of the New Mexico Statutes 1978. Article 31 addresses offenses involving controlled substances. The maximum penalty for the most serious single offense, (manufacture, sale, or distribution) is eighteen (18) years in prison and a \$15,000 fine. The maximum penalty for the most serious single possession offense is eighteen (18) months in prison and a \$5,000 fine. The maximum penalty for the least serious state offense (possession or use of one ounce or less of marijuana) is a fine of \$100.00 and fifteen (15) days in jail. The state laws concerning driving under the influence of alcohol (see below) apply equally to driving under the influence of drugs.

SOUTH DAKOTA:

South Dakota state criminal statutes may be generally found under Chapter 22 of the South Dakota Codified Laws. The maximum penalty for the most serious single offense, (manufacture, sale, or distribution) is twenty-five (25) years imprisonment and a \$50,000 fine. The maximum penalty for the least serious state offense (possession or use of two ounces or less of marijuana) is a fine of \$2,000.00 and one (1) year in jail. The state laws concerning driving under the influence of alcohol (see below) apply equally to driving under the influence of drugs.

TEXAS:

Texas state criminal statutes may be generally found in the Texas Penal Code. Drug offenses are addressed in the Texas Controlled Substances Act, Chapter 481 of the Health and Safety Code. The maximum penalty for the most serious single offense, (manufacture, sale, or distribution) is term of life or ninety-nine (99) years in prison and a \$250,000.00 fine. The maximum penalty for the least serious state offense (possession or delivery of drug paraphernalia) is a maximum fine of \$500.00. Possession of a small amount of marijuana (2 ounces or less) is punishable by a fine of up to \$2,000.00 and a jail term up to 180 days. The state laws concerning driving under the influence of alcohol (see below) apply equally to driving under the influence of drugs.

3. State - Alcohol Penalties:

COLORADO:

State laws regulating the production, dispensation, possession, and use of alcohol may be found in Title 12 of the Colorado Revised Statutes. State laws prohibit the distribution of alcoholic beverages to any person under the age of 21, to a visibly intoxicated person, or to a known alcoholic. State laws also prohibit any form of assistance to these categories of people in obtaining alcoholic beverages. Violation of these laws is a misdemeanor punishable by fines of \$1,000.00 and jail sentences of a year. However, such conduct may, in some circumstances, constitute contributing to the delinquency of a minor, and it could then be determined to be a felony offense punishable by a six (6) year prison sentence and a \$500,000.00 fine. Secondary civil consequences for liquor law violations may include ineligibility for liquor and driver's licenses.

Criminal sanctions may also apply to those who operate motor vehicles while under the influence of alcohol and/or drugs. Under Section 42-4-1301 (1) (a), Colorado Revised Statutes, the maximum penalty for such an act is eighteen (18) months in jail and a \$5,000.00 fine.

If a person is injured as a result of someone operating a motor vehicle while under the influence of alcohol and/or drugs, the act is a felony punishable by four years in prison and a \$100,000.00 fine. If a person is killed, the sentence can be eight years in prison with a \$500,000.00 fine. All such convictions also result in the revocation of driving privileges.

State law requires drivers who are stopped by the police for suspected violation of this law to submit to scientific tests which determine the amount of alcohol in their blood, and those who refuse to be tested automatically lose their driver's license.

KANSAS:

State laws regulating the production, dispensation, possession, and use of alcohol may be found in Chapter 41, Article 7 of the Kansas Statutes Annotated. State laws prohibit the distribution of alcoholic beverages to any person under the age of 21, or to an incapacitated or intoxicated person. Violation of these laws is a misdemeanor punishable by fines up to \$500 and jail sentences of six (6) months. Secondary civil consequences for liquor law violations may include ineligibility for liquor and driver's licenses.

Criminal sanctions may also apply to those who operate motor vehicles while under the influence of alcohol and/or drugs. Under Section 8-1567, Kansas Statutes Annotated, the first conviction for such an act is up to six (6) months in jail and a \$1,000.00 fine.

State law requires drivers who are stopped by the police for suspected violation of this law to submit to scientific tests which determine the amount of alcohol in their blood. Anyone who fails a test or refuses to be tested will have his or her driver's license suspended for one year on the first occurrence.

MINNESOTA:

State laws regulating the production, dispensation, possession, and use of alcohol may be found in Chapter 340A of the Minnesota Statutes. State laws prohibit the sale or distribution of alcoholic beverages to any person under the age of 21, or to an obviously intoxicated person. Violation of these laws is punishable by ninety (90) days in jail. Underage drinking carries a minimum fine of \$100. Trying to purchase alcohol with a fake ID can result in a loss of driving privileges for at least ninety (90) days.

Criminal sanctions may also apply to those who operate motor vehicles while under the influence of alcohol and/or drugs. Under Minnesota law, the first conviction for driving while impaired carries a penalty of up to ninety (90) days in jail and a \$1,000.00 fine. The penalty increases by a minimum of 30 days in jail if the driver fails to submit to a blood alcohol test. Driving minors cited for any amount of alcohol use will lose their license from 30 to 180 days, and face up to a \$700 fine and 90 days in jail.

MISSOURI:

State laws regulating the production, dispensation, possession, and use of alcohol may be found in Chapter 311 of the Missouri Revised Statutes. State laws prohibit the distribution of alcoholic beverages to any person under the age of 21, to an intoxicated person, or to a habitual drunkard. State laws also prohibit any form of assistance to these categories of people in obtaining alcoholic beverages. Violation of these laws is a misdemeanor punishable by fines up to \$1,000.00 and one year jail sentence. Modifying a driver's license to create a fake ID carries the same maximum penalty. Using a fake ID to buy alcohol results in a \$500 fine for each separate offense. Secondary civil consequences for liquor law violations may include ineligibility for liquor and driver's licenses.

Criminal sanctions may also apply to those who operate motor vehicles while under the influence of alcohol and/or drugs. Under Section 577.010.1, Missouri Revised Statutes, the maximum penalty for a first offense is six (6) months in jail and a \$500.00 fine.

State law requires drivers who are stopped by the police for suspected violation of this law to submit to scientific tests which determine the amount of alcohol in their blood, and those who refuse to be tested automatically lose their driver's license for one year.

NEW MEXICO:

State laws regulating the production, dispensation, possession, and use of alcohol may be found in Articles 7A and 7B of Chapter 60 of the New Mexico Statutes 1978. State laws prohibit the distribution of alcoholic beverages to any person under the age of 21 and to an intoxicated person. State laws also prohibit any form of assistance to these categories of people in obtaining alcoholic beverages. Violation of these laws may be a felony punishable by fines up to \$5,000.00 and eighteen (18) months in jail. Minors who attempt to buy, receive, possess, or permit themselves to be served alcoholic beverages will be fined \$1,000 for a first offense and ordered to perform 30 hours of community service.

Criminal sanctions may also apply to those who operate motor vehicles while under the influence of alcohol and/or drugs. Under Chapter 66, Article 8 of the New Mexico Statutes 1978, the maximum penalty for a first offense is six (6) months in jail and a \$500.00 fine. If a person is killed as a result of someone operating a motor vehicle while under the influence of alcohol and/or drugs, the act is a felony punishable by three (3) years in prison and a \$5,000 fine. All such convictions could also result in the revocation of driving privileges.

State law requires drivers who are stopped by the police for suspected violation of this law to submit to scientific tests which determine the amount of alcohol in their blood, and those who refuse to be tested may have their driving privileges revoked from six (6) months to one (1) year.

SOUTH DAKOTA:

State laws regulating the production, dispensation, possession, and use of alcohol may be found in Title 35 of the South Dakota Codified Laws. State laws prohibit the distribution of alcoholic beverages to any person under the age of 21, to a visibly intoxicated person, or to a known alcoholic. State laws also prohibit any form of assistance to these categories of people in obtaining alcoholic beverages. Violation of these laws is a misdemeanor punishable by fines of \$2,000.00 and one (1) year in jail. A minor who purchases, attempts to purchase, possesses, or consumes an alcoholic beverage is subject to a fine of \$500.00 and thirty (30) days in jail. Secondary civil consequences for liquor law violations may include ineligibility for or revocation of liquor and driver's licenses.

Criminal sanctions may also apply to those who operate motor vehicles while under the influence of alcohol and/or drugs. Under Section 32-23-2, South Dakota Codified Laws, the maximum penalty for a first offense is one year imprisonment and/or a \$2,000.00 fine. With some exceptions, a first offender will automatically lose driving privileges for a minimum of thirty (30) days.

State law requires drivers who are stopped by the police for suspected violation of this law to submit to scientific tests which determine the amount of alcohol in their blood. Failure to submit to a test is grounds for driver's license revocation.

TEXAS:

Texas state criminal statutes may be generally found in the Texas Penal Code. Offenses involving alcohol can be found in Chapter 49 of Title 10. State laws regulating the production, dispensation, possession, and use of alcohol may be found in the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Code. State laws prohibit the distribution of alcoholic beverages to any person under the age of 21, to an intoxicated or insane person, or to a habitual drunkard. State laws also prohibit any form of assistance to these categories of people in obtaining alcoholic beverages. Violation of these laws is a misdemeanor punishable by a fine between \$100.00 and \$500.00 and jail sentences of a year. Purchase, possession, or consumption of alcohol by a minor carries a penalty of \$500.00 for a first offense.

Criminal sanctions may also apply to those who operate motor vehicles while under the influence of alcohol and/or drugs. Under Section 49.04(b), Texas Penal Code, the maximum penalty for such an act is \$2,000.00 fine and 180 days in jail. The offense carries a mandatory minimum of seventy-two (72) hours confinement.

If a person is injured as a result of someone operating a motor vehicle while under the influence of alcohol and/or drugs, the act is a felony punishable by between two (2) and ten (10) years in prison and a \$10,000.00 fine. If a person is killed, the sentence can be up to twenty (20) years in prison with a \$10,000.00 fine.

State law requires drivers who are stopped by the police for suspected violation of this law to submit to scientific tests which determine the amount of alcohol in their blood, and those who refuse to be tested automatically lose their driver's license.

D. Health Risks

1. Alcohol

Alcohol is a widely abused drug on college campuses across the United States. Liquor, beer and wine contain ethyl alcohol which acts on the central nervous system as a depressant. Abuse can cause intoxication, impaired motor skills, unconsciousness and death. Alcohol is chemically addictive and can cause brain cell damage, liver, pancreas and kidney damage; heart problems,

stomach ulcers, high blood pressure and birth defects, such as fetal alcohol syndrome. Alcohol is one of the most socially problematic drugs in this country. Many lives can be destroyed through its abuse. Driving while intoxicated has been a serious problem and issues especially relevant to college campuses within the last decade. Alcohol is frequently associated with instances of rape, violence and many types of accidents.

2. Marijuana

Marijuana is the most widely used illegal drug in this country; however, many fail to recognize its many harmful effects. Use of marijuana is detrimental to one's physical, emotional and mental well-being. Marijuana smoke is even more toxic and carcinogenic than cigarette smoke, causing similar and more serious respiratory problems. Habitual use weakens the immune system, increasing the chance of sickness. Evidence from studies shows that marijuana reduces one's ability to perform tasks requiring concentration, impairs short-term memory and motor skills and affects a noticeable decrease in motivation. Although claimed to be non-addictive, marijuana is a habit-forming substance that can be as hard to quit as any chemically-addictive drug. In other words, marijuana is a social drug that has the potential to become the center of one's life. The potency of this drug has increased 275% in the past three decades, giving even more weight to its negative effects. Marijuana use impedes one's participation with the academic community, damaging the intellectual atmosphere of the university.

3. Hallucinogens

Hallucinogenic drugs distort the perception of reality. Common hallucinogens include LSD, magic mushrooms, mescaline and peyote. An individual's reaction to these drugs is completely unpredictable, and "bad trips," which can cause permanent personality changes, are common. Under the influence of hallucinogens, the senses of direction, distance and time become disoriented. These drugs can produce unpredictable, erratic and violent behavior in users that sometimes leads to serious injuries and death.

4. Cocaine

Cocaine is a strong central nervous system stimulant that is extremely addictive. Derived from coca leaves, it produces euphoria, hallucinations and a temporary increase in physical strength. Common symptoms include irritability, runny nose, increased temperature and blood pressure and chronic sinus/nasal problems. More serious side effects include severe depression, seizures, respiratory arrest, cardiac arrest and strokes. Cocaine, which is used as a social drug, initially produces an intense physical stimulus, but this quickly disappears. The user typically becomes addicted after the first use. Prolonged use can cause nervous-system damage, delusions, physical deterioration, weight loss and a stronger addiction.

5. Heroin

Heroin, a highly addictive opiate, causes physical and psychological problems such as shallow breathing, nausea, panic, insomnia and a need for increasingly higher doses of the drug to get the same effect. Attempts to stop using the drug lead to painful physical withdrawal symptoms. Heroin is primarily taken by injection, often with grave consequences. Uncertain dosage levels (due to differences in purity), unsterile equipment, contamination with cutting agents, or heroin use in combination with such other drugs as alcohol or cocaine can cause serious health problems such as serum hepatitis, skin abscesses, inflammation of the veins and cardiac disease (sub acute bacterial endocarditis). Of all illegal drugs, heroin is responsible for the most deaths. Needle sharing by IV drug users is a leading cause of new AIDS cases. Heroin used during pregnancy is

associated with stillbirths and miscarriages. Symptoms of heroin overdose include shallow breathing, pinpoint pupils, clammy skin, convulsions and coma.

6. Designer Drugs

Designer drugs, such as Ecstasy, among countless others, are chemically manufactured substances. Produced in underground labs, these are often pre-existing drugs that are modified in order to produce a more potent effect. Since these drugs are usually mixtures of several compounds, their toxicity is much higher, and the chance for negative side-effects or overdose increases. Because designer drugs are often used in a social atmosphere, there exists a high chance for psychological dependence. Many of these synthesized drugs are also chemically addictive.

7. PCP

PCP, a hallucinogenic drug used as an anesthetic for animals, induces a profound departure from reality, which may leave the user capable of bizarre behavior and severe disorientation. PCP-induced effects may lead to serious injuries or death to the user while under the influence of the drug. PCP often produces feelings of mental depression, and among regular users disturbs memory, perception functions, concentration and judgment. Chronic use may lead to permanent changes in cognitive ability (thinking), memory and fine motor function.

E. Counseling, Treatment and Rehabilitation

Drug and alcohol counseling, treatment, and rehabilitation/re-entry programs for employees and students are available from a variety of sources. Anyone who recognizes a personal drug or alcohol problem, is concerned about a student or co-worker, or may wish to know more about drug and alcohol abuse may contact the human resources department.

Campus and community resources may be found on MyNAU or by contacting a campus executive officer or the human resources department.

10. REPORTING OF SEXUAL OFFENSES AND HARASSMENT

A. Policy

National American University is committed to a policy of nondiscrimination in employment and education opportunity. No person shall be discriminated against in the terms and conditions of employment, personnel practices, or access to and participation in education programs, services, and activities with regard to race, sex, color, creed, religion, age, national origin, disability, marital status, status with regard to public assistance, or sexual orientation or membership or activity in a local commission as defined by state and federal law, as applicable.

Harassment of an individual or group on the basis of race, sex, color, creed, religion, age, national origin, disability, marital status, status with regard to public assistance, or sexual orientation, or membership or activity in a local commission has no place in a learning or work environment and is prohibited. Sexual violence has no place in a learning or work environment. Further, National American University shall work to eliminate violence in all forms. Physical contact by university staff members may be appropriate if necessary to avoid physical harm to persons or property.

This policy is directed at verbal and physical conduct that constitutes discrimination/harassment under applicable state and federal law and is not directed at the content of speech. In cases in which verbal statements and other forms of expression are involved, National American University will give due consideration to an individual's constitutionally protected right to free speech and academic freedom.

In support of the university policy, National American University reaffirms its policy that sexual harassment, including violence, abuse and harassment will not be tolerated. Every effort will be made to ensure that all members of the university community are provided an atmosphere free from sexual harassment. To prevent sexual offenses and harassment, educational efforts will be undertaken to inform employees and students of their responsibilities regarding such behavior, how to identify and eliminate sexual harassment, and what steps can be taken if instances of sexual harassment are experienced.

National American University conducts a number of programs aimed at preventing sexual offenses and making the campus community aware of the potential of such crimes. These programs include conducting security checks of campus doors, inspecting all campuses for potentially dangerous areas and implementing programs to inspect campus lighting and shrubbery around campus facilities. In addition educational programs concerning sexual assault awareness are provided by National American University upon request. The *Strategies for Success* class provides a means by which issues involving sexually transmitted disease and sex offenses can be addressed. The course also includes relevant information about rape, acquaintance rape, forcible and non-forcible offenses, legalities, options, evidence, counseling, etc.

B. Procedure

Contact the local campus security authority (as identified in Paragraph 2.1.A.) and/or the local police department (911 or 9-911) as soon as possible after the offense. Please remember it is most important to preserve evidence. Do not bathe, douche, use the toilet or change clothing. Note everything about the location. If you have been sexually assaulted, you should seek medical attention immediately regardless of whether you want to report the matter to the police or National American University.

Every attempt is made to maintain the anonymity of the sexual assault survivor. The local campus security authority will provide information regarding counseling to support sexual assault survivors. Each report of a sexual assault will be investigated in order to provide better protection to the survivor and all members of the campus community. Sexual assault survivors should be aware of the need of the university to release information regarding the fact that an assault has occurred for the protection and safety of others. Information concerning the identity, address and other personal information of the sexual assault survivor will not be release.

The local campus security authority's office will be the office of official record for reports of sexual assaults, as it is in all reported violations. Student, faculty and staff are encouraged to contact the local campus security authority to report any information regarding a sexual assault. Sexual assault survivors have the right to have reports made to the appropriate local police department. The campus security authority will assist the survivor in making this report if the survivor so wishes. In these situations, the name of the complainant will not be forwarded unless approved by the survivor. Third party and anonymous reports may prevent National American University and law enforcement from actively investigating the criminal activity.

Counseling and medical services are available off campus at each campus location. If you are the victim of a sexual assault, National American University encourages you to contact one or more of the following: the appropriate local police department, the local National American University campus security authority, local crisis counseling centers, local health services clinics, women's resource centers or the local hospital.

If the local campus security authority (or his/her designee) determines that a threat continues to exist for the campus community where the criminal activity occurred, information about the reported sexual assault will be reported to the campus community whether reported by a sexual survivor or through a third party report. As much detail as possible regarding location, date and time of the assault, and any information that might help identify the assailant will be reported. The local campus security authority (or his/her designee) will inform the campus community of the reported sexual assault by posters, appropriate notices, campus newspaper, radio stations, local media, electronic mail and/or other means.

Each report will be taken as presented by the complainant. Appropriate criminal classifications will be determined after a review of all facts by local law enforcement authorities. National American University will take appropriate action to safeguard the alleged survivor and, at the same time, protect the rights of the alleged perpetrator. If the survivor of a sexual assault requests, the university will attempt to provide, if reasonably available, alternative housing for on-campus residents as well as a change in classes.

National American University will normally not take any disciplinary action against any member of the campus community without a written complaint and the assistance of the complainant in the disciplinary

process, unless the university determines there is a clear danger to the victim or the local campus community.

C. Procedures for Campus Disciplinary Action for Sex Offenses:

1. The National American University disciplinary process is an option for any person wishing to report a case of student misconduct. In order for National American University to proceed (whether by a victim or a third party), a report must be filed with the university. If the complaint is criminal in nature, it will also be forwarded to the local campus security authority and/or the local police department.
2. There are different standards of proof in the university conduct proceedings than in possible criminal action. The university conduct proceedings determine whether the accused's status as a student will be altered, whereas the criminal process determines if there will be limitations on the accused's liberty.
3. Both the accuser and the accused are entitled to have others present (an advocate or an advisory) during the disciplinary proceeding. This person may not speak in your place or ask questions of witnesses.
4. Both the accuser and the accused have the right to call a reasonable number of witnesses and shall have the right to question witnesses during the hearing.
5. Both the accuser and the accused have the right to request, in advance, the names of witnesses and shall have the right to question witnesses during the hearing.
6. Students found guilty of violations of serious cases, such as rape or other forcible or non-forcible sex offense, are subject to suspension, expulsion, and eviction from student housing (Rapid City campus only) in addition to other possible university sanctions. (See the NAU Student Handbook for a complete description of sanctions.)
7. Both the accuser and the accused will be informed of the outcomes of any campus disciplinary proceeding concerning the complaint of a sexual offense according to applicable state law. This information should not be disclosed to the public generally.
8. In cases where the alleged perpetrator is a student and taking the same classes as the complainant, the complainant may request the National American University registrar to change class schedules. Such requests will be granted if reasonably available and if a complaint has been filed with National American University and/or the appropriate local police department. If desired, NAU personnel will assist individuals in making a report to the local police department.

D. Registered Sex Offender Notification:

The federal Campus Sex Crimes Prevention Act, enacted on October 28, 2000, requires higher education institutions to provide a list of law enforcement agency information provided by the state concerning registered sex offenders. It also requires sex offenders already required to register in a state to provide notice, as required under state law, of each higher education institution in that state at which the person is employed, carries on a vocation or is a student.

12. MISSING STUDENT NOTIFICATION POLICY (RAPID CITY CAMPUS ONLY)

A person may report a missing student by making a report to the Rapid City Campus Residence Life Director at the College Inn at (605) 394-4870. A student may be considered missing when a student is absent for a period of time without adequate explanation and such absence would be regarded as highly unusual or suspicious by persons familiar with the student. Upon the receipt of missing student report, the university will notify law enforcement of such report. The university will also contact a parent or legal guardian if the missing student is under the age of 18.

Students may designate a contact person that the university will contact within 24 hours of a student being deemed missing. Students may register confidential contact information to be disclosed to law enforcement personnel during a missing person investigation.

13. THE ANNUAL CAMPUS FIRE SAFETY REPORT (Rapid City Campus Only)

A. General Statement of University Owned/Controlled Student Housing

National American University's Rapid City campus residence hall is monitored by a State Fire Marshall approved and regularly inspected fire alarm systems 24 hours/day, seven days/week. The residence hall is covered by automatic fire suppression sprinkler systems. The fire system is a Harrington HS 3400 Intelligent Address System and it is serviced by Adtech Inc. The monitoring company is Midwest Alarm.

The residence life director, the buildings and grounds employees and residence hall staff receive comprehensive fire safety training at the beginning of the quarter. In addition a program that covers emergency and evacuation procedures is reviewed regularly with the occupants and staff of each residence hall. Emergency evacuation maps are posted on each dorm floor to direct residents to exits. Fire drills are conducted quarterly. Basic fire safety instruction is provided to both new and current employees.

B. Specific Fire Prevention Policies

It is the policy of National American University to provide faculty, staff, students and visitors with the safest possible environment, free from potential fire hazards. The university takes appropriate action before conditions result in a fire. Basic fire safety instruction is provided to new employees. To minimize the potential for fires at National American University, it is the policy of the university to prohibit open burning and open flames. The residence hall handbook includes the following:

Candles and Incense

- Burning candles or incense is not permitted in student rooms due to the danger of fire caused by the open flame.

Fire

Equipment Misuse

- Tampering with the fire alarm system, the fire equipment, or the escape doors can cause injury or death to you and other residents. Residents tampering with fire equipment or setting off a false alarm (a felony offense) will be subject to serious disciplinary action including, but not limited to, expulsion from the residence hall. Residents expelled from the residence hall must still honor their residence hall agreement.
- The alarm is connected to a central monitoring station and simultaneously sounds at the residence hall.

City and State Codes

- National Fire Protection Association Fire Prevention Code: 3-1.1.14: "Interference with Fire Protection Equipment. No person shall render any portable or fixed fire extinguishing system or device or any fire warning system inoperative or inaccessible except as may be necessary during emergencies, maintenance, drills or prescribed testing."

Alarms and Evacuation Procedures

- For your protection and with the cooperation and encouragement of the Rapid City Fire Department, fire drills are held periodically throughout the year. Rooms will be checked to assure that all students have vacated.
- When the fire alarm sounds in your building you must vacate the building at once. If you are not in your room when the alarm sounds, proceed directly to the nearest exit. **DO NOT RETURN TO YOUR ROOM.**

Failure to leave during a fire alarm will result in a fine of no less than \$25. Every alarm must be considered an actual fire, and the entire building is to be evacuated. Everyone in the residence hall at the time of the alarm must stay out until the residence life director or other officials in charge re-open the building. Go to the parking lot behind the Animal Health Building or the parking lot across the street from the west wing. If you notice that someone is missing, report his/her absence to a staff member or to the Rapid City Fire Department.

Extinguishers

- Fire alarm boxes and extinguishers are located on each floor in each wing. There is also a fire extinguisher in the laundry room. Please become familiar with their locations. You may also report a fire by calling 9-911.

Holiday Decorations

- Natural holiday trees will be permitted in the main lobby only. You may have an artificial tree in your room. Such trees must be flame retardant.
- Strings of lights may be displayed around windows and doorways. Exercise caution with window drapes and paper decorations near these lights. Be sure that the lights do not touch any flammable objects or materials. Only miniature lights may be used as they produce less heat and consume less electricity than the large bulbs. Extension cords without circuit breakers are prohibited. All lights and cords must be UL approved.
- Do not leave holiday lights unattended. When you leave your room, unplug the lights.

Light Fixtures

- The use of acetate, cellophane, tissue paper, or other combustible materials over or in the light fixtures is forbidden by fire regulations.

Smoking

- Because of the high risk of fire, smoking is prohibited in the residence hall. The residence hall is a smoke-free environment. Designated smoking areas are located outside the front lobby door and outside the West Wing door.

To minimize the potential for fires at National American University, it is the policy of the university to prohibit cooking in any dormitory room. Accordingly cooking devices/equipment is prohibited in dorm rooms. This includes microwave ovens, toaster ovens, griddles, grills, slow cookers, electric skillet, deep fryers and other such small appliances.
